

MIS STUDENT UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS

2023-2024

Introduction

It is our school policy that all students wear school uniform when attending school, or when participating in school-organised events outside normal school hours. Uniform can be bought at local shops including supermarkets. In addition, Ascot Uniforms stock most items of uniform.

Aims

We believe that a school uniform is important because it:

- Identifies the students with the school
- Helps to create a sense of community and belonging
- Gives a sense of pride and common purpose
- Looks smart
- Makes students feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance
- Is designed with health and safety in mind

We ask that all students wear the uniform and encourage them to maintain a good standard of clean and tidy dress in school.

Policy

The uniform requirements for EYFS, Primary and Secondary will be published on the school website each year. Parents will be reminded of the uniform requirements at regular intervals throughout the year.

Any items supplied by the school (ties, book bags) will need to be replaced at the parent's expense if lost or damaged.

In the case of any required arbitration, the final decision of what is acceptable remains with the school. If a student's appearance is deemed inappropriate by the school principal and or heads of school, parents will be contacted to resolve the issue.

For students, failure to comply with uniform requirements will result in school age-appropriate sanctions (e.g., break time or afterschool detention)

Monitoring and Review

The uniform requirements will be reviewed annually.

EYFS: FS1 and FS2

PE Kit - girls and boys (EYFS to 6)

On timetabled PE days, all children wear their PE kit to school:

- Plain white polo shirt or t-shirt
- Plain navy shorts or plain navy tracksuit (logos or similar kept to a minimum)
- Athletic style trainers with non-marking soles, closed toes, and closed heels ideally white
- White socks

All jewellery must be removed for PE and shoulder length hair must be tied back with a plain black, blue, or white hair band.

The following items are not part of EYFS or Primary school uniform and must not be worn in school.

- Hooded tops / sweaters
- Any tops or jumpers with logos
- Smart watches
- Jewellery (other than one pair of stud earrings)
- Any earrings other than studs
- Facial piercings, unless worn to practice local customs
- Torn, untidy or dirty clothing

Nail varnish is not allowed in school.

Secondary: Years 7 to 11

- ❖ Hair must be styled without artificial, vibrant, or contrasting colour
- Hair must be neat and well groomed

For House events children will need a plain t-shirt or polo shirt in their house colour

School Ties (Key Stage 3-4)

Students in Key Stage 3 and 4 are provided with a tie to wear in school every day. It is navy blue with a house colour stripe. If a student loses or damages the tie, they must pay for a replacement

PE kit – female and male – Years 7 to 11

Kit to be brought to school in a separate bag

- Plain white polo shirt with a collar
- Plain navy shorts or plain navy-blue tracksuit
- Athletic style trainers (or football boots for sports field activities during winter months)
- White socks
- Navy blue or white baseball cap
- Water bottle clearly marked with the student's name

Swimming kit must include towel and hairbrush $\!\!\!/$ comb all in a waterproof bag. Girls must wear a one-piece costume.

Boys must wear swimming shorts.

Sixth Form

Sixth form students are not required to wear the same uniform as the rest of the school. There is, however, an expectation that sixth form students are dressed appropriately in a manner that represents themselves and the school favorably. Their appearance should set a positive example for younger students to aspire to.

Female Students	Male Students
 Tailored blouse or top, with short or long sleeves, formal in style with no more than the top button undone Loose fitting blouses/tops of sufficient length to tuck into skirt or trousers V neck or round neck jumper, tank top, cardigan, or jacket, plain in style with no logos Smart tailored trousers with a plain design, no patch pockets, rivets, or obvious stitching Formal skirt worn as an alternative to trousers, a plain design, falls below the knee and not tight fitting Dresses that fall below the knee and not tight fitting. An abaya may be worn as an alternative to business dress Formal shoes with a sensible heel (3cm max) Tights or socks Head scarves of any suitable colour that match the outfit Make up and nail varnish is permissible, subtle in colour and design 	 Collared shirts that are worn tucked in trousers Tie Smart tailored trousers with a plain design, no patch pockets, rivets, or obvious stitching Belts, plain in colour with a simple buckle V neck or round neck jumper, tank top, cardigan, or jacket, plain in style with no logos Suit jacket is optional Formal shoes
A Hair must be studed without artificial, vibrant, or	contracting colour

- Hair must be styled without artificial, vibrant, or contrasting colour
- Hair must be neat and well groomed
- In winter months coats may be worn outdoors but should be of a simple design and maintain a professional appearance in line with the rest of sixth form dress

For House events students will need a plain t-shirt or polo shirt in their house colour

Jewellery

Female students may wear stud earrings, with a single bracelet, necklace, or ring. This is to be minimal and discreet

Secondary School – All Key Stages (Year 7-13)

The following items are not part of the secondary school uniform and must not be worn in school

- Hooded tops
- Items of clothing with logos or branding
- Smart watches
- Facial piercings, unless worn to practice local customs
- Torn, untidy or dirty clothing
- Immodest, revealing, or tight-fitting clothing
- Shorts, cut-offs, or anything that could be considered beach or leisure wear
- Sports shoes / trainers, boots, sandals, flip-flops, sliders, or backless shoes
